

A Year of Memorable Performances ... and Postponements

The Garde's final public event in 2020 was on March 8 with a screening of the movie 1917 - set in the year before the flu pandemic of 1918. More than 4900 patrons attended the Garde that week, none knowing it would likely be 18 months before they could return. By the end of 2020, the Garde will have lost \$1.8 million in ticket sales from the previous year, with 45,000 tickets for future events waiting for new dates.

In the brief period between January and March, 2020 the Garde presented 13 live shows, with memorable performances including:

Regretfully, the Garde was forced to cancel many planned events by the region's finest arts organizations who faced challenges to their own survival including:



Focus on the Community

ISAAC School: The Mercer Building storefronts now house classrooms and performing arts spaces for the Interdistrict School for Arts and Communication (ISAAC) middle school.

City of New Londor: The Garde is hosting supplementary education programs supervised by the Dropln Learning Center for students who need assistance during the school week when they are not in school and either can't be left home alone or have limited home internet access and guidance to complete the home portion of their hybrid learning.

Census: The Garde staff and trustee members helped promote and provided assistance for the New London Census campaign.

Statewide Advocacy: The Garde has been a leading advocate for relief funding for the arts in Connecticut, in partnership with the Southeastern Connecticut



Cultural Coalition, and working closely with other arts organizations, most notably as a member of" Six PAC", the six urban-based major performing arts centers: The Bushnell, Place in Stamford, Waterbury Palace, Shubert, and the Warner in Torrington. Efforts resulted in a recent \$9 million CT COVID Relief Fund for 154 arts organizations.

Protecting the Palace

As the proud owner and steward of a nationally acciaimed movie palace and adjacent historic properties. This past year the Garde began improvements for a more inviting and safe space once doors open again.

- · New safety railings in the balcony and stairways
- Touchless restroom fixtures
- · New HVAC systems and airflow study
- Improvements to the backstage "green room" to enhance artist and crew safety

Revenue Comparison 2020 vs 2019

The shutdown of the Garde in March has created a 44% decrease in revenue for the calendar year, an estimated loss of \$1.2 million.

Donations will Save The Garde

On March 13, the Garde's prime source of revenue - tickets, facility rentals, and concessions disappeared for the remainder of the year and beyond: There were no more Garde performances, films and events, nor rehearsals and performances by the Eastern Connecticut Symphony, Eastern Connecticut Ballet, Connecticut Lyric Opera, and numerous dance and performing arts studios. Approximately

\$98,000 in ticket sales had to be refunded. With future events postponed as many as three times, there will likely be no significant safe theater occupancy until Fall 2021.

Since March 13, the generosity of hundreds of donors has made sure that the Garde - with a skeletal



staff, significant overhead, and diminishing resources - survives the pandemic and continues to serve the community while planning for a post-Covid reopening.
