About Les Ballets Africains

Les Ballets Africains, established in 1952 by the esteemed Guinean choreographer Keita Fodeba, is the premier dance company of Guinea. Recognized as Africa's most renowned and accomplished dance company, Les Ballets Africains has toured globally, presenting a living demonstration of Africa's rich cultural heritage. The ensemble's performances, which include acrobatics, comedy, and drama, are deeply rooted in the cultural traditions of Guinea and are performed in traditional costumes to the music of traditional instruments.

This famous ensemble, which has toured the four corners of the earth during an illustrious career, is universally recognized as Africa's most renowned and accomplished dance company. For 70 years, Les Ballets Africains has represented its country, continent and culture at some of the world's most prestigious international festivals and venues.

Each production tour spans up to two years, presenting hundreds of performances across the globe.

Symphonie of the Grand Masks-



The traditional African mask is a symbol of divinity. The masks represent the four principal cultural regions of Guinea: Nyamba of the Coastal Region, Cimier Koniagui of the Lower Region, the Konkoba Djeli of the Higher Region and the Nyamou of the Forest Region. The masks symbolize approval and support for the young men being initiated into adulthood. Considered apprentices, the young men must learn their role in the traditions and in society, symbolized by this rite of passage. The bote' is a small tambour (drum) that is played during these grand festivities and announces the departure of the initiated. A powerful fresh rhythm of sengbe (double drum) shows homage to the Grand Mask Protector as he receives offerings from the families of the young apprentices.

The Significance and Role of Masks in Guinean Society:

3. Harvest Celebrations

Harvest celebrations are communal events that give thanks for a bountiful harvest and seek blessings for future agricultural success.

Role of Masks:

- Fertility and Abundance: Masks used in harvest ceremonies often symbolize fertility and abundance, invoking the spirits to bless the community with prosperity.
- Community Unity: The use of masks in these celebrations fosters a sense of unity and collective gratitude among community members.

Example:

• **Bwa Masks**: These masks, used by the Bwa people, are vibrant and often depict animals or ancestral spirits associated with fertility and harvest.

4. Fertility Rites

Definition:

Fertility rites are performed to ensure the fertility of the land, animals, and people.

Role of Masks:

- **Invocation of Fertility Spirits**: Masks represent fertility deities or spirits, believed to enhance reproductive success and agricultural productivity.
